Winning five out of the last six class 3A jazz band state championships, to Harlan Community High School being named a National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education. HCSD has been home to twelve state football championships, is one of the leading ACT scores in the state, and is the state recognized QPPS Pre-School program. HCSD academic benchmarks are amongst the best in the state with a strong focus on the lowa Professional Development Model engaging in the 21<sup>st</sup> century skills across the curriculum. # Featured Member: Harlan Municipal Utilities



It's difficult to sit in a well-lit and cool office surrounded by computers, telephones, printers, fax machines, cell phones and other devices powered by electricity and envision Harlan 125 years ago. Imagine opening your store and stoking a fire in a Franklin stove for warmth. Lighting a kerosene lamp for light. Tallying receipts by hand instead of entering data into a spread sheet. Accepting only cash as payment. Communications with vendors taking weeks instead of moments. And, by the way, there is no flat screen TV hanging on your wall, no KNOD playing in the background, no air conditioning or forced air furnace and no water fountain or refrigerator to supply a cool drink. And at the end of the day, you walk home via a dark street.

On January 20, 1891, 304 visionary citizens, presumably well represented by the business community, voted to establish a municipal light plant and water works for Harlan. They knew the key to economic growth was electricity. Electricity meant light. Heat. Motors. Commerce. Growth. Prosperity. A steady water supply helped protect downtown business from the devastation of fire.

From its founding, the value of what would become the Harlan Municipal Utilities to Harlan was apparent. Controlling your own electricity meant controlling your own business growth and future. Controlling your water supply meant fire protection and safe drinking water.

Newspaper accounts indicate on Saturday, August 22, 1891, "F.E. Cook and CO.'s Drug Store had the honor of being the first business housed in Harlan illuminated by electricity." It's believed F.E. Cook was at 622 Market, now occupied by China Pan. The entire downtown business district was individually, and collectively, now powered by electricity.

Fast forward 35 years. In order to meet growing capacity from increasing residential and commercial electric appliances and applications, a new light plant was built on east Chatburn Avenue in 1929. This plant eventually powered not just the economic engine of Harlan but the surrounding area as it sold electricity to the newly formed Nishnabotna Valley REC as well as the towns of Shelby and Tennant. "Profits" from the plant were funneled back to the city as a way to fund civic projects as opposed to raising taxes.

By the 1950's, natural gas was a viable low cost fuel alternative. HMU gas service began in 1954. By the late 50's the federal dams in South Dakota offered low cost electricity and HMU began moving away from local generation. The savings from decreased energy costs benefitted all.

As in the 1890's, the 1990's saw the emergence of a new wonder; the Internet. Control over data transfer and access would be just as critical to business growth as electricity was 100 years before. In 1995, voters, again well represented by the business community, established one of the first municipal telecommunications utilities in Iowa. Cutting edge fiber technology allowed Harlan to be one of the early communities in the US to link critical organizations like Harlan Community Schools, Myrtue Medical Center, the City and County to the world via fiber optics.

Since that fateful Saturday night 125 years ago when a dim bulb first lit up F.E. Cook and Company, HMU has unfailingly served and been a crucial part Harlan business and commerce.




